# Funding for rural leadership

The Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia is offering its third annual Rural Leadership Initiative grants.

Rural Leadership Initiative promotes rural leadership development in the process of serving community needs.

The intent of these grants is:

- · to enhance leadership within rural communities.
- to develop skills relating to leadership capacity.
- · to clearly identify and build on existing resources in the community.
- to increase the understanding of the impact of leadership on rural communities.

Applicants must be a registered charity (or be sponsored by one) and the program or service must relate to rural leadership, with a goal of enhancing leadership within rural communities.

The typical grant size varies between \$1000 and \$5000 for projects. \$15,000 in total has been allocated for the 2010 Rural Leadership Initiative granting program.

Applications will be accepted after September 30th until noon on October 31, 2010.



Paul moved up to ProAm this year. He admits racing is tough at this level on a shoestring budget. Paul is his own engineer, coach, and pit crew. He has a full time job, a wife, family obligations, just like any regular guy. He doesn't complain. He is analytical about his chances. He's always up with the front runners and from long experience he knows consistency pays off. Paul is

Paul is popular at Shubenacadie and it's easy to see why. He spends his free time cheering for other riders, giving tips, asking advice, helping the other guys get ready, and always with a thumbs up when they head out for their next run. He lives for racing. There's no mistake about that.

I asked him about the season over-

He got two podiums that weekend, and being the final race of the year it was the last chance to work and race alongside his friends/rivals. They have a lot in common by now, everyone ground down a bit from a tough hot summer, empty pockets, worn equipment, and the lingering knowledge that one of their

There were other casualties this summer, for different reasons. Ronnie MacLean, of Baddeck, didn't finish out the year as he had hoped. He opted to head west, as many young men do, to try for a better job, to reset his goals. Next year remains uncertain.

Paul looks to the future, gathering enormous satisfaction from his two young proteges. Kenzie Timmins, and Crowdis Roberts showed real talent in their first appearances on the track. Paul is passionate that racing makes better drivers, teaching respect for the machines, the road conditions, and other riders. The track gives kids a place to go, to test their limits in a controlled environment. Paul hopes to pass on his knowledge, the importance of discipline, in a tough and some-

For himself, he hopes to race a few more years, but his dream is to have a bike shop he could run full time, to devote himself totally to his sport.
