


Steve Sutherland, host of CBC Sydney's Information Morning, initiated a series of interviews with twenty-two people (including those listed above) whose accomplishments have gained them praise and, in some cases, wealth.

Broadcast over several months, the taped interviews provided insights into the motivations, the attitudes and the advice of people as varied as those above and others such as Rodney MacDonald, Elizabeth May, Irving Schwartz and Billy Joe MacLean.

In response to the request of the public that the interviews be transcribed and put in print, Steve Sutherland set himself to the task. In cooperation with the staff at CBC and Mike Hunter along with his people at Cape Breton University Press, Steve did the work of transcription.

Cape Bretoners.

As well, it is a useful educational publication for teachers and for community developers for it opens a number of useful doors to the practice of leadership.

A capable and energetic interviewer, Steve Sutherland provides clear insights into how to conduct interviews and how to pick up clues for further discussion as the informants speak. His questions encouraged the interviewees to respond with clarity and details.

This is a book about and for Cape Bretoners. It is available at the usual outlets. This fall, Sutherland has initiated a new series of interviews with a sampling of people who have been identified as leaders of the future. These are being broadcast on CBC Information Morning radio program.

Hurrah for CBC for its leadership in this project and to CBU Press for its fine response. The partnership is a good one and follows a previous one in the preparation and publication of "Nancy's Wedding Feast and Other Tasty Tales."

There are leaders in Cape Breton, both in the past and the present. The book encourages us to ask "how do we encourage future leaders?"

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
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FIDDLER'S CORNER by Paul S. Cranford.
