The property on which it is situated was granted to one Donald Mac-Donald in June of 1837. In 1861, the land was deeded to William MacRae. William married Donald MacDonald's daughter, Kate and this house was

the 1950's when it was in possession of the MacQuarrie family. In the course of some renovations and general repairs, carpenters came across a board which bore Mr. MacDonald's signature and the date of 2nd May, 1874.

Architecturally, the style of this

house is simple vernacular and in keeping with the type of architecture for that time period. It is one and a quarter storey of wood construction with a steeply pitched gable roof. The front façade is three bay and symmetrical. There has been a more recent single storey addition to the rear of the original dwelling.

This house is a Municipally Registered Heritage Property and is part of the built heritage inventory of the county.
