The Baddeck & Area Historical

Society members had an assignment for their monthly meeting in March - to bring a list of area businesses from the past.

Willie Roberts set the scene with his memories of Chebucto Street in the 1930's.

"There was just an

alley way between the Congregationalist Church and Bethune's Garage," Mr. Roberts recalled. The church had stood

empty for over a decade, when in the 1890's Mabel Bell purchased the building, renamed it Gertrude Hall and turned it into a library for the community. It was one of the first libraries in Cape Bre-


ton and by the 1930's was well stocked with 7000 books. It burned in a spectacular fire in December 1939.

"I remember the night the library burnt," Roberts said. "There was a saw mill at Bethune's Garage, down behind, near where the Co-op is now. I remember hearing the mill when we were in school at the old Baddeck Academy,"he said.

Mr. Robert's reminiscences next took us to the empty lot to the west of the Telegraph House. This area once housed the Thistledown Restaurant, but prior to that, it was a tea room operated by Murdock MacAskill (who was perhaps better known as 'The Bishop').

"You could go in there and get ice cream in a saucer - what a treat that was! I remember the new Bras d'Or House (Wongs) had livery stables in back and Alex MacKenzie had a barbershop between the (new) post office and the Telegraph House. He was called the 'Silent Barber' because he never said a word, but he always cracked his gum."

"Angus MacKenzie had a tea room

Some news concerning the Royal Canadian Navy 100th Anniversary celebrations follows. The Stadacona Band will present concerts across the Province, starting on April 25th at Cornwallis; in Halifax on April 26th at the Rebecca Cohn Theatre; May 23rd in Canso at the Canso Academy and the final concert in Sydney on July 31st on the Boardwalk.

The actual date of the Anniversary is May 4th, and in Halifax on that day 1,000 sailors will march through the streets of Halifax. On the following week, the HMCS Toronto will be in Sydney, an International Fleet review will take place in Halifax, starting with the arrival of ships on June 23rd and stay until July 2nd. On March 30th, I attended the Last Post Fund annual meeting in Halifax. As of April 1st, Marc Gauthier will be the new regional manager of the refurbished Atlantic Region which will consist of Last Post Fund Branches in Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The Nova Scotia Branch, of which I am the director for Cape Breton Island, will continue to operate. Our Branch is made up of volunteers, except for the office staff. The office on Chebucto street will also stay intact and Adm. (ret'd) Barry Keeler was asked to stay on as President during this transition year. All other officers and directors agreed to stay on board.

The Last Post Fund-Special Grave Marking for the period April 1, 2009 to March 15, 2010, included 31 cases, of which 21 were accepted, 2 not approved due to service or financial eligibility and 8 were withdrawn due to no interest on the part of the potential applicant. The Last Post Donation Fund paid for 7 grave markers (\$4,455.55) and the Veterans Affairs paid for 20 markers (\$19,478.65). At the present time in Cape Breton, we have 4 cases waiting for approval.

I just received notice from MLA Keith Bain on Resolution No. 153, Baddeck Academy Students: Remembrance Day Poster Contest, which he presented to the Legislature:

WHEREAS, last November, Baddeck Academy was the only Cape Breton-School with three separate Provincial Remembrance Day artwork poster finalists, who all placed second in their respective grade categories; and

WHEREAS, the three finalists were Grade 9 student Kaitlin Chadwick in the Junior Black and White Division, Grade 10 student Brittany Fitzgerald in Senior Colour, and Grade 8 student Duncan Nicholson in Intermediate Colour; and

WHEREAS, Royal Canadian Legion Branch in Cape Breton, which had respective placings in the Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all MLAs in this House of Assembly applaud the dynamic artwork exemplified by those three students at Baddeck academy, keeping alive the achievements and sacrifices made by those who served and are serving in times fo war and conflict.
