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culture of Cape Breton. Earl Gwinn, a founding member of the original museum, accepted the plaque on behalf of the museum, which celebrated its 30th anniversary last year.

Heather Morrison presented a captivating slide show of historical photos accompanied with heartfelt stories of how this museum was founded. The museum's roots were largely due to the efforts of her grandmother, Ruth Morrison, who started decorating her general store/restaurant with artifacts collected from community members. They feared they might lose their culture and heritage when the Gypsum quarry closed. By the late 1970s, there were so many artifacts collected that Ruth coordinated the building of the original museum - a log building on a concrete base, built by Jim McEvoy and crew in 1979. Fred Lawrence and Doug Taylor built the fireplace, which became central to the new museum.

The existing museum was built right over the old one in 2003. Greg Silver, a designer, was contracted to set up the artifact displays with the help of dedicated

community volunteers such as Fritz McEvoy.

Recently, the United Church congregation in Cape North donated their church to serve as a cultural centre for guest speakers, concerts and theatre; a Settler's Garden was designed by Esther Danielson and brought to life by Claudia Gahlinger and Rejean Chamberland of South Harbour Organic Farm; Bill Danielson set up a weather machine; and the forge and boatshop were erected to give youth an opportunity to redeem skills of bygone days. The North Highlands Community Museum is a worthy candidate for the Lions Club Citizen of the Year award as it has done so much to build community spirit. Cape Breton culture will continue to be celebrated at this museum under such vibrant, dedicated, community volunteers.

The Lion's Club Charter night concluded with members kicking up their heels to the tunes chosen by DJ Norm MacDonald.

The Lion's Club will host their annual golf tournament at Highland Links this July.
