# Ingonish resident charged

Ingonish

The Nova Scotia RCMP Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) Unit laid more than 250 charges as a result of a 20 month investigation into the possession, distribution andmaking of child pornography.

David Carter Roger Archibald, 62, of Ingonish Beach, Cape Breton is facing 176 counts of Distribution of Child Pornography, and 76 counts of Making Child Pornography.

The RCMP ICE Unit previously charged Archibald with one count of possession of child pornography in February 2011 as part of this investigation. The total number of charges is now 253.

Through the RCMP's national and international partnerships, the investigation started after RCMP received information from the National Centre for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) in the United States and the National Child Exploitation Coordination Centre (NCECC) in Ottawa.

In January 2011, the RCMP searched and seized a number of computers and related equipment. Following a comprehensive and thorough review of these materials, police retrieved several thousand images of child abuse and examples of pornographic text. None of the material seized portrayed local children.

"Each time a photo is viewed or distributed the child in that image is victimized," says Cst. Paul Smith, Nova

Minsiter of Education not in the loop

#### School Board Chair blames Department of Education

"Where they are now is a mystery," said Cape Breton-Victoria Regional; School Board Chair, Lorne Green, referring to the N.S. Department of Education.

Mr. Green was speaking to Victoria County Municipal Council on May 24th regarding the changes in the plans to the renovations at Baddeck Academy.

He was asked by Warden Bruce Morrison if the School Board communicated with the Minister of Education Ramona Jennex about the reduction of classrooms and teaching spaces at Baddeck Academy.

"The Deputy Minister gets in the way," he responded.

On May 19th, Victoria-The Lakes MLA Keith Bain had asked the Minister of Education, Ramona Jennex, to immediately intervene in the talks between her department, the school board and the school administration over the Baddeck Academy renovation project.

"These conversations have been going in circles for two months now and nothing has been resolved," said Bain. "Getting the renovation project right with the adequate number of program spaces is extremely important for the administration's ability to deliver the quality education students deserve."

Parents, teachers and concerned community members attended the Council meeting to hear what Mr. Green had to say about the issue.

When questions were taken from the gallery, parent Jennifer Morrison asked Mr. Green what it would take to get a meeting with Minister Jennex.

He replied that the Minister has not met with any school board in the province since she took over the education portfolio. He also said the Nova Scotia School Board Association is meeting next week and he is hopeful the Minister will be in attendance.

With the reduction of space and the loss of 1.4 teaching positions at Baddeck Academy the school will not have the resources to provide all of the programs for students intending to do post
