Using research already completed by the province and ACOA's Tourism Atlantic, DCB is developing products which include coastal/seacoast experiences, sightseeing and touring; culture entertainment and heritage; outdoor activities; major and international events and experiential accommodations. To this list DCB has added cuisine. To this end a new culinary event that will profile the producers and suppliers of culinary product from Cape Breton called "Right Some Good Foodie Event" from August 27th to September 5th.

Victoria County has representatives on DCB's Product Development Committee, Visitor Services Committee and their Marketing Advisory Committee.

The niche market segments of golf, meeting and conventions and the cruise ship sector all figure highly in Victoria County.

"We are finding out how the best are doing it and doing it better," Ms. Tulle told Council.

"Our marketing goals are to increase the visits to our experiential icons such as Cape Breton Highlands National Park, Alexander

Graham Bell Museum, Fortress of Louisbourg and Provincial Museums such as the Highland Village in Iona by 5%. We are also increasing Cape Breton's profile and brand awareness among the on-line travel industry marketplace."

Ms. Tulle responded by saying that it has been talked about but there has been no movement yet. "We need to research and do the product development and learn how to target the off-Island market."
