The County's history through its buildings

The building depicted in the photograph is no longer extant. It had been located midway along Chebucto Street in the Village of Baddeck and was situated directly across the street from the former White Store.

It is believed to have been built in the mid - 1880's. According to A.F. Church's map of Victoria County, this building is shown on the inset map of Baddeck in 1886.

The history of the building was always of a commercial nature. Murdoch (Buckets) MacLeod purchased the property and building from a John MacLeod in 1901. Murdoch operated a store there for three years. In 1904, he sold the building to Daniel MacLeod and his brother William



MacLeod. They commenced business under the name of MacLeod & Company. Apparently, in the beginning they had a difficult time, as they had to build up their trade in order to compete with the other long established merchants operating in the village. They persevered and were successful in their business endeavour which flourished for several decades.

In 1955, heirs of the MacLeod's sold the property to a local entrepreneur who relocated his drug store

business to the premises of the former MacLeod & Co. store. In 1960, the original structure was removed in order to make way for a new building. Over the years, many additions have occurred to the new structure and at present, the building on the site of the original MacLeod store houses three businesses which include a drug store along with hardware and clothing outlets.

Architecturally, the style of this building was classic Greek Revival. It was one and one half storey with a steeply pitched gable roof with return eaves. The front façade was three bay and symmetrical with an indented main doorway. The gable end of the building was pedimented with a cornice above the façade which had pilasters on both corners (the pilasters are indicative of the columns which identity the Greek Revival style of architecture).
